What is Hate Crime?

Hate Crime is a crime against someone because of their:

- Disability
 - Race (where the person or their family comes from)



- Religion
- Sexuality (fancying someone of the opposite sex, or the same sex, or both)



• Transgender (someone who feels their body isn't right for them. They want to change from a man to a woman or a woman to a man)



Hate crime has to stop! You can stop it, if you report it

Hate crime is more than bullying. Here are some examples ...

If someone hits you or throws things at you.



If someone calls you names or threatens you.



If someone sends you nasty texts or emails.



If someone takes money from you.



If anyone does something bad to you, and you think it is because they see you as different, it is a **Hate Crime**

If you report it... you can STOP it!

There are lots of things the police and the council can do to stop hate crime ... but you need to report it.

★ The Police will talk to people who commit hate crimes and can arrest them.



If they rent a council house and cause trouble, the council can move them away.



The police and the council's community engagement team can keep an eye on your house.



Why is it important to report hate crimes?

- To get help and support
- · To stop it getting worse
- To stop it happening to someone else
- So the police can punish the criminals
